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The evils of which we complain are those most common in the larger cities where the competition for vacancies by boys in all branches of business is most severe; and where, as a rule, the time ordinarily required for the acquisition of an education is notably shortened in order that the labor of the boy may be made available

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There is nothing that adds more to the neatness and attractiveness of job work or composition of any kind, outside of good presswork, than correct and proper spacing and justification. I do not mean by this the setting apart at regular intervals in a line each individual word, as generally understood among a large majority of printers, but the more comprehensive system of equal balance on all sides of words, lines, letters, and so on. I fear book spacing is too often understood to mean each word just so far from its next fellow, without regard to making the next line conform to the one above in thin or thick spacing. Too often

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
