

In its simplicity and directness of operation and mechanism, the Supersurfacer measures up to Ludlow standards. Each slug is rapidly processed with a combination of simple motions. There are no interrupting extra motions between the acts of inserting, feeding and removal of the slug.

The Supersurfacer has a minimum of wearing parts and adjustments, having been designed for long life and freedom from mechanical troubles.



- By pressing outward the handle of the slug-clamping mechanism, the jaws are opened for placing the shank of the slug on its kide in the champ-where it is held solidly and evenly under spring pressure while being surfaced. The faces of the slug-clamp jaws are grooved, so that any bits of metal which might interfere with accurate seeting are disludged as the slug is inserted. An occasional brushing of the grooved surfaces removes any accumulation of metal chios in the crooves.
- 2 The surfacing operation is account ished by pushing the carriage on which the clamp is mounted past the motor driven high-speed revolving cutter. Before reaching the cutter, the slug-face is lubricated by an oiled felt-roller which can be seen directly below the clamp handle in this illustration.
- 3 After surfacing, every slug has a mirror-smooth printing surface of even plane. In height-to-paper, it is even throughout its length, and uniform with other slugs surfaced to the same micror eter setting.
- 4 The surfacing of this slug-tray of "pre-made-ready" slugs required only a few minutes, due to the rapidity and simplicity of the operation, as illustrated. After being surfaced, the tray of slugs, not ready for immediate use, may be removed from the convenient Supersurfacer (slug-tray rack shown in this illustration.

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Front view of Supersurfacer. A slug clamped in place for surfacing can be seen in the slug-clamp at the right. Hand-wheel and scale for micrometric adjustment are located within the belt-guard casting at the left. Notice the convenient location of the electric switch and of the slug-tray on the rack.

Side view of the Supersurfacer with superarier possel forward on its round supporting rails which may be easily adjusted to compensate for any possible wear. Notice the cutter head (reversible, with 16 almost razor-shape cutting teets no both sides) under left end of slug-clamp, which also acts as a quard. Motor mounted below table at rear drives ball-bearing cutter-spindle through endless. "De blt at 4200 r. p. m. Shavings drop into removable trimpan located just below cutter."
